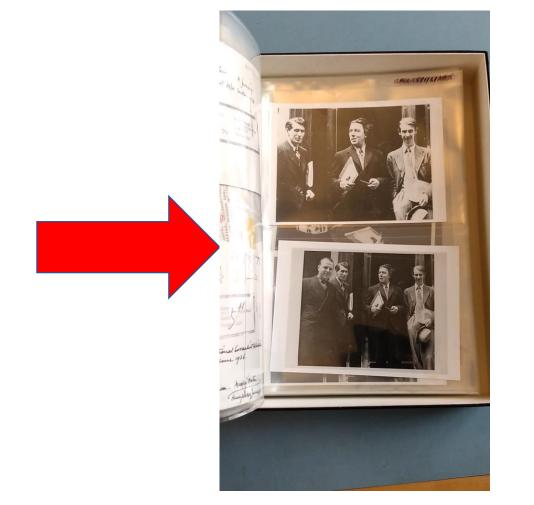

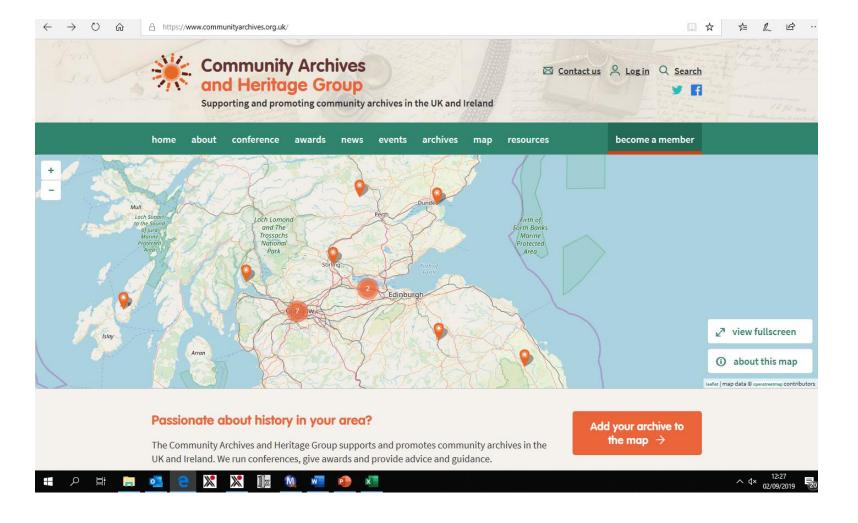
Scottish Archives Online

SCA are developing a new portal for accessing Scotland's online archive catalogues. Building on the success of the Scottish Archives Network (SCAN), the portal will provide a nationwide online resource and discovery tool that provides a dynamic and comprehensive means of accessing Scotland's collections, including local authorities, universities and community archives. The project will improve the level of archive information available to current and potential users and provide more opportunities for engagement both physically and virtually with archives.

SCA will be working with the Archives Hub, on an eight-month pilot project from January 2019 to understand more of the issue around data export and aggregation. Six repositories around Scotland are participating. It is hope that the new portal will launch in 2020.

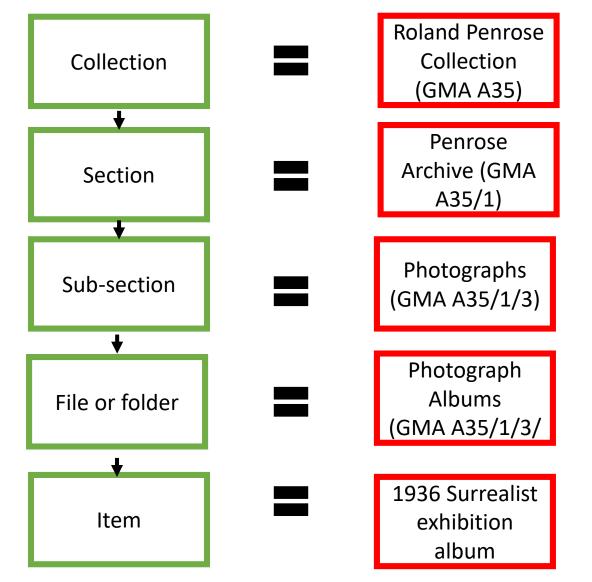
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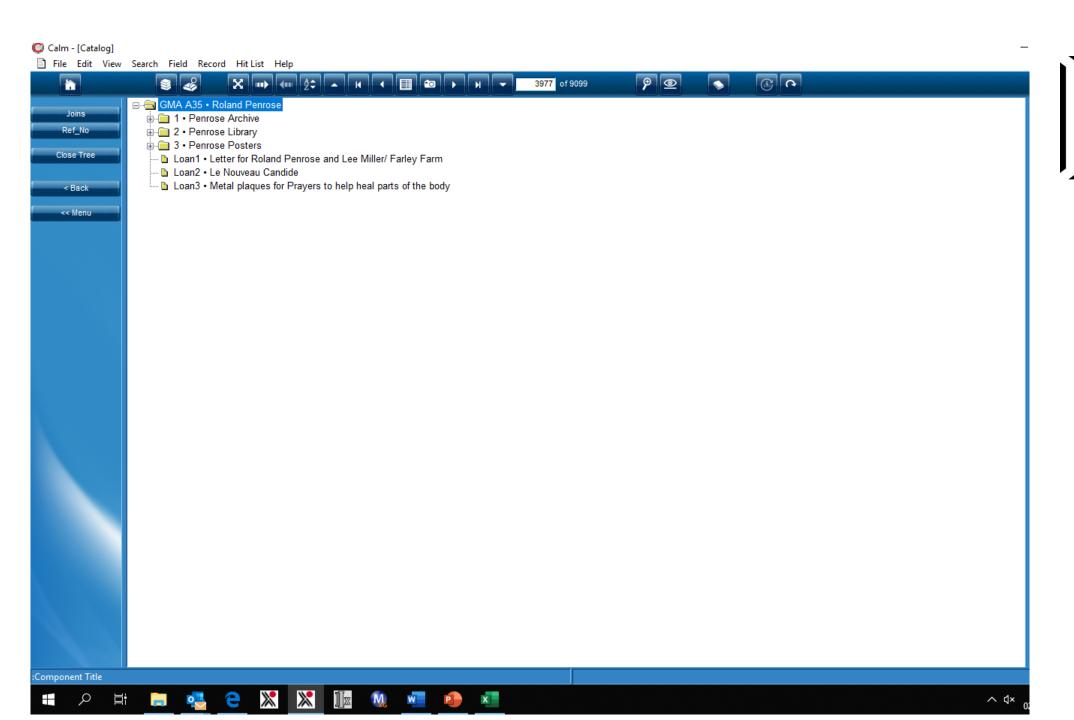


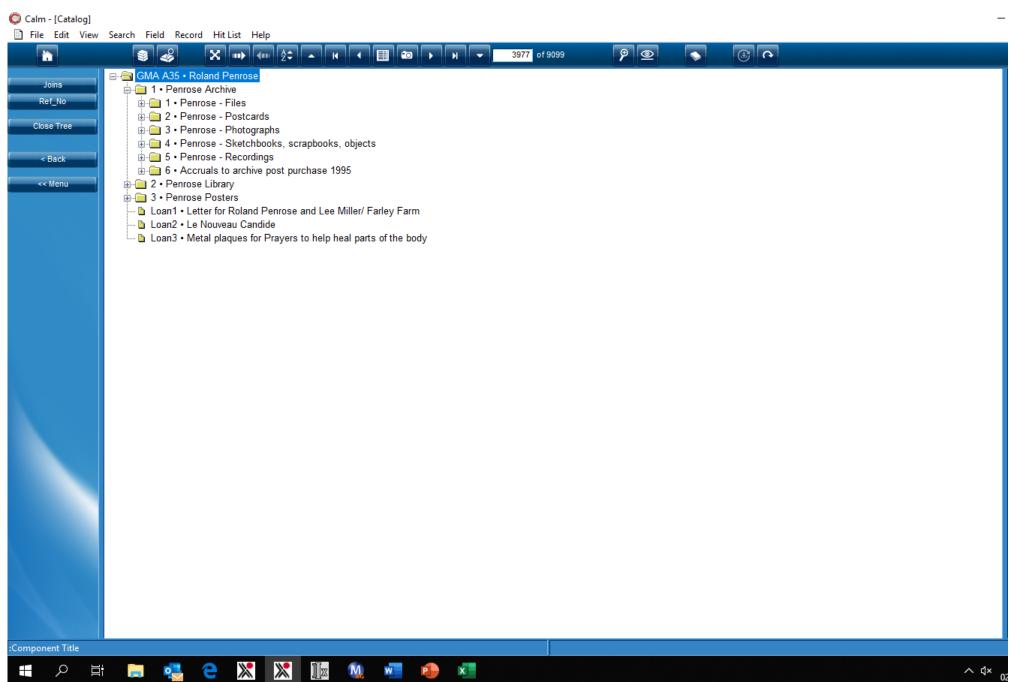


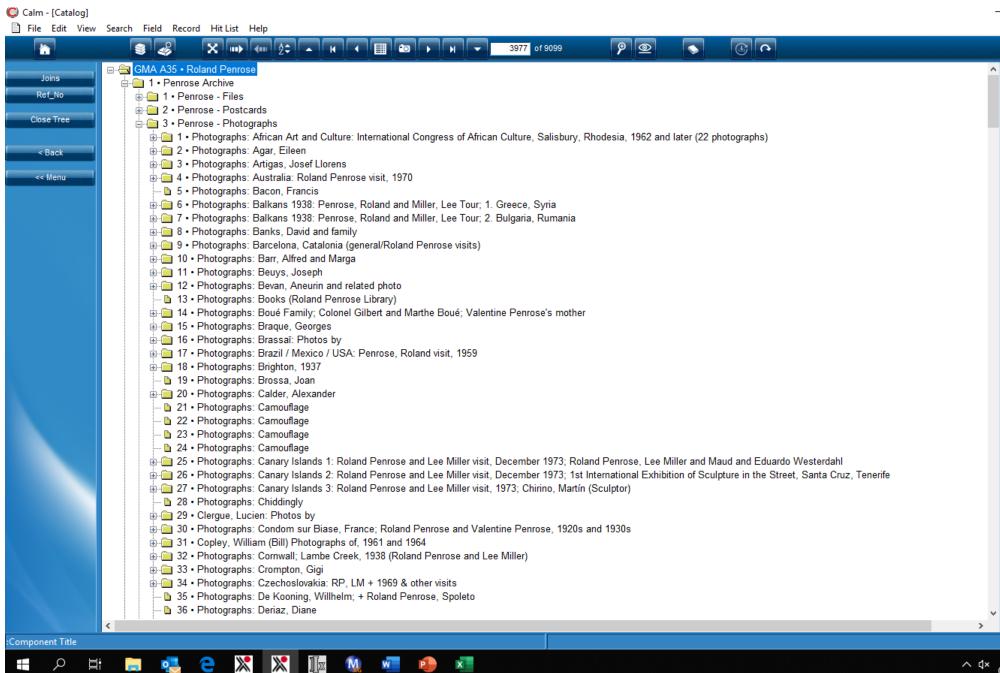

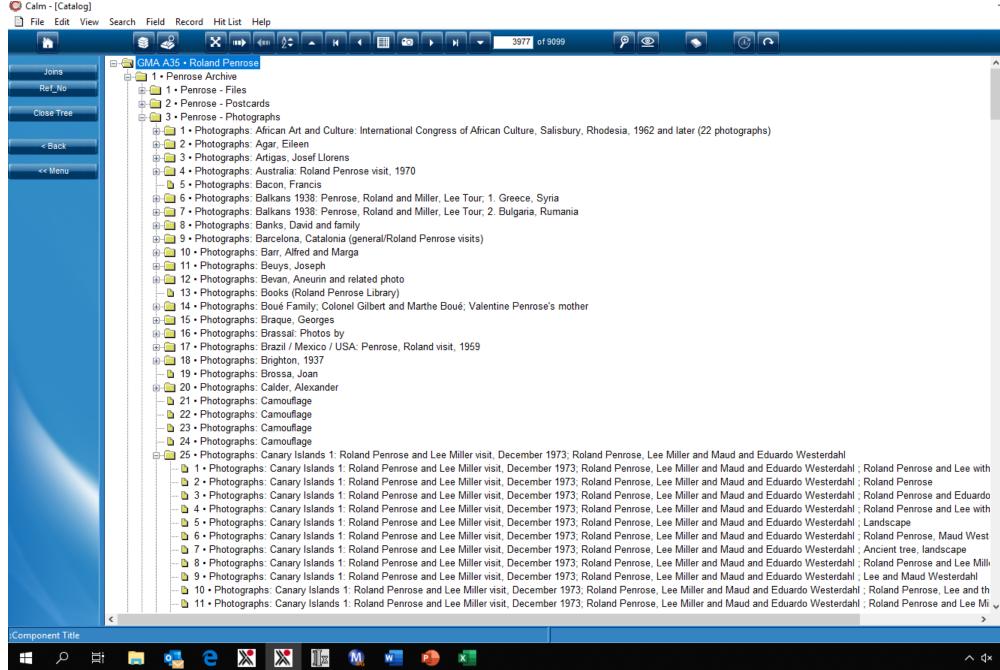
Levels in an archive collection

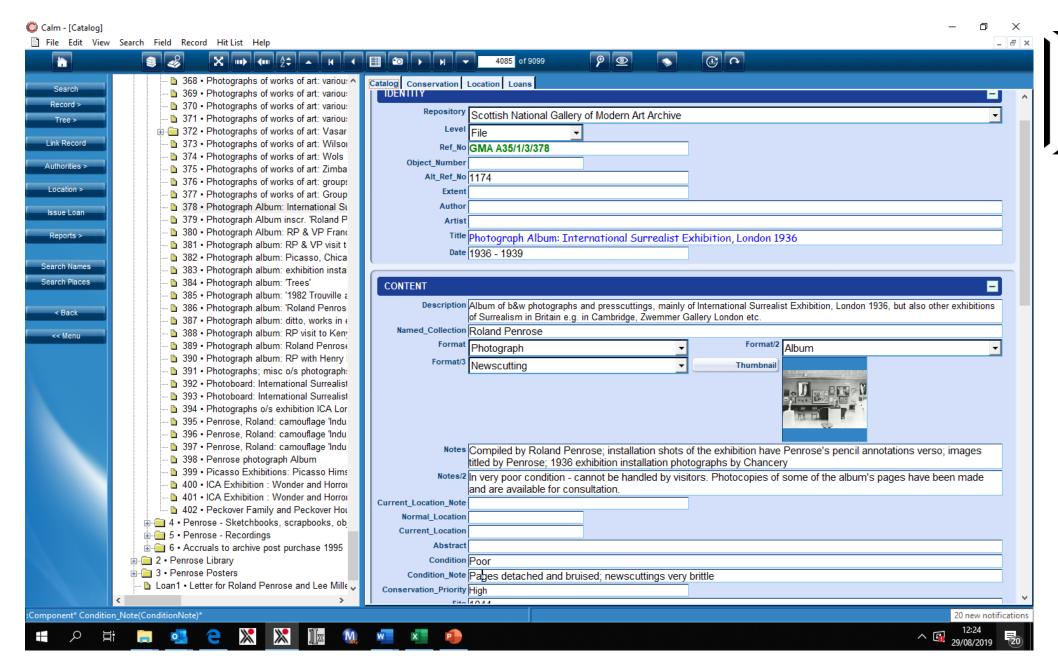














Using Excel to catalogue

If you don't have archive software like CALM, use Excel:

- It's usually included free on Windows
- Most people are familiar with it, or can easily pick it up
- It's easy to input data into
- It's searchable
- The data can be exported into CALM or other databases of archive collections later on

Cataloguing tips:

- Be accurate! Check your spelling, and double check people's names
- Give as much contextual information as possible, it'll help when searching
- Try and give a description of the image (especially if there are lots of similar images) – e.g. 'tower block with young boy in foreground and dog barking at left'
- Have a format cheatsheet nearby: https://www.nedcc.org/free-resources/preservation-leaflets/5.-photographs/5.2-types-of-photographs
- Don't use the term 'miscellaneous' it's not helpful!

How do you number the photograph?

Don't use something that doesn't come off (like pen). Use pencil to write on the back of the photo (not on the image itself).

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Depending on the paper, can use a normal pencil, or a chinagraph pencil:



Or, can write in pen on the enclosures if you don't want to write on the photographs themselves:
